- IV. Special Business of the Day Item A: Dr. Steve Large, Assistant Vice President for Student Life - Health and Wellness
 - a. Motion to reorder

 - d. Dr. Large: Hello! It is really great to share virtual space with you all. My name is Steve, and I am the Assistant VP for Wellness for Student Life. I oversee the SHS and SCS. I have my hands in a variety of different arenas with Covid. My guess would be largely around Covid, but we can talk about anything. I have a dog who is feisty, so you may see me throw toys at him. Some of you sent guestions ahead of time, so I can respond to those to start. First, the advantage of certain masks over other masks, can Miami supply N-95s? There's cloth reusable masks, there's surgical masks, and there are N-95 and KN-95. The biggest difference between those is the level of protection they provide you from droplets or germs. Cloth masks provide the wearer protection from larger droplets. Coughing, sneezing, things of that level. Surgical masks provide a little more protection, and the other two provide the most protection. Some say anywhere around 95% protection from any droplets. There's a variety of reasons, filters and tightness around the face. N-95 have the strictest requirements, and are seen as better than KN-95s. Second part is can Miami supply these. The honest answer is I don't know. Miami has purchased some masks that are being provided to interested folks, faculty, frontline staff. I don't know how many we purchased and if they'll be able to be given to students. I would imagine they would be distributed similar to at-home tests, so let me see if there are any follow-up questions. Do you think that would be well received by students? Would you yourself use that?
 - e. Senator Olabode: That seems like it would be a great idea, because in one of my classes my professor asked us to wear KN95s, so having that distributed would be really helpful.
 - f. Dr. Large: Some universities require that students use a certain mask, and Miami is not.
 - g. Senator DeVictor: It would be helpful, but a big issue is mask fatigue. I think the biggest issue is people aren't wearing them, so I guess we could distribute them to people who will actually wear them.

- h. Dr. Large: I suspect that part of the reason we don't require a specific mask is for that reason, we don't want to give people another reason to not wear masks. You're absolutely right. I took a note there, and I meet with Dr. Brownell soon so I'll pass this along. Second question is what would the criteria be to return to fully remote? It's on our radar, and when we're planning, we have best, middle, and worst case scenarios. We had so many contingencies in place for people being tested before they moved on campus. It's probably unlikely, and would be mostly driven by staffing. There are a lot of people we need to keep everything moving, and if they can't come to work, then we would consider it. Right now, we seem to be okay, but that would be one of the larger metrics.
- i. Senator Giaquinto: Right now professors aren't required to have Zoom options for people with Covid, but could that be an option again?
- j. Dr. Large: This question comes up a lot. For our academic faculty partners, it's hard to give a one size fits all answer. All professors teach differently. All faculty have been expected to give some kind of flexibility for students with Covid, but that could look different. Recording, Zoom options, notes, etc. Anyone want to speak to accommodations from Spring 2020?
- k. Secretary Waugh: Most of my professors got it up and went right away. Two had live class via WebEx, three went asynchronous. I never experienced any tech issues I don't think. It's a little bit different, because there was no way to dial in.
- I. Dr. Large: I will say, I always encourage students to use your voice and advocate for yourself. If you or your peers are not receiving the accommodations they expect, they should talk to the chair or the dean. This is more of a bullet point, it says quarantine/isolation housing for on-campus students. This semester is different because Miami is only providing isolation space for on-campus students. We have 128 beds, and we shifted to isolation only to make sure we had enough beds. This was made with the County Health Department and State Health Department. Right now, we have 16 that are placed in isolation, and 4 pendings. We'll have 20 in our isolation space. Another difference is length of time, according to CDC guidance. The county health department has requested that the student test out on day 5, so if a student wants to test out they can get a test.
- m. Secretary Waugh: I heard something about students who live within about 150 miles having to go home to quarantine. I understand concerns about occupancy, but what about if the student doesn't feel comfortable. What would you all do?
- n. Dr. Large: We did put that into place. Off-campus students have always had to find their own accommodations, but for on-campus students, we were really concerned about an influx of cases. Therefore we decided to request that if students live within 150 miles away from Miami, they go home. However, we understand that not everyone can go home for various

- reasons, but the student just needs to be able to tell us that. We are prepared for that if that comes up.
- o. Senator Hughes: I'm an RA, and I've had residents approach me if they've had close contact. If they're boosted and asymptomatic, they're told to just keep going. Many of them are uncomfortable with that. What is the best way to navigate that?
- p. Dr. Large: I think the CDC's revised guidelines were perceived as encouraging for some and scary for others. If they're a close contact, they're not required to do anything. My first thought would be to offer them validation and compassion. As an institution, I don't believe we have anything for them, because we wouldn't put them in an isolation space. Another option is helping brainstorm with the student what their options are and what their level of distress is. Ask them if they can return home or stay with a friend. We don't have a system response for that. Another question, which was limits on social gatherings with student organizations. How big of a group is too big and how long should meetings be remote? We as an institution were intentional about not being overly prescriptive with numbers of how big is too big, which we did at first with covid. The reason is we want to empower students to make decisions with their own circumstances. Some groups may be more comfortable and some may have access to bigger spaces. We wanted to emphasize choice and make local decisions. It's hard to put a number to how big is too big, so I would encourage you to think about how many students are meeting and how big is the space. Also, do you have an option for those who don't want to meet in-person? Greek Recruitment is a good example, and they have a virtual option.
- q. Senator Crone: How is testing going to work, I know it used to be proctored?
- r. Dr. Large. One test is diagnostic, which you use if you have symptoms for Covid. You go to SHS, and it's a PCR test. We also do surveillance testing, same saliva test, but participation is not required. If people weren't compliant, we would send them to community standards. We don't have the personnel for that, and it eroded some of the trust between SHS staff and students. The other option is at home tests. The tests we're giving out right now are not proctored, and they're not super official or anything.
- s. Secretary Sutton: Specifically with buses on campus, I've noticed that buses are packed full. I understand I would be upset if the bus didn't pick me up, but coming from this Covid mindset, it's been a little alarming seeing so many people. Are there any specific measures regarding that?
- t. Dr. Large: That's the first time I've heard. The university has a relationship with BCRTA, so what we can do is follow-up with them and ask how they're managing riders and users to wear masks and to make sure that this is an expectation of their drivers. Especially with the weather conditions we've had and probably will have, more students will be riding the bus, so the buses are important.

- u. Senator Davies: We've been seeing surging with Omicron, and we're meeting online now, and yet dining halls haven't brought the take-out option back. I talked with Secretary Pallant, but it just seems like a disconnect to me.
- v. Dr. Large: That was discussed during J-term as a tactic to consider, going back to takeout containers, and ultimately the decision was made due to staffing. I was told that the to-go container approach actually requires more people power than the current approach. Staffing is a huge issue, and so we couldn't do that. Is that something you think would be well-received by students? I see some checkmarks.
- w. Senator Davies: Last semester when you were here speaking to US, there was a conversation about a mental health fee, and looking at ways we can increase mental health support. I was wondering if there were any updates.
- x. Dr. Large: The proposal was created and shared wit ASG, and the Board of Trustees approved it as well. We're still waiting to hear back from the Chancellor's office. We've heard the wait for a response is not indicative of their response, but just how busy they are. We're waiting for feedback or hopefully a decision.
- y. Senator Ogunnowo: I also received complaints that classes are packed, and besides masks and testing, what other covid regulations are in place?
- z. Dr. Large. You and your constituents are concerned about the number of people in classes. That's good to know. There's a few things I haven't talked about. First, wastewater testing. The university has five locations across campus where we regularly test the wastewater for the presence of Covid. It's another form of surveillance. We did that through support from the state. That is another helpful way to have a sense of what's going on. It's been interesting because what we have seen is that the presence of Covid in the wastewater has mirrored surveillance testing. It helps to speak somewhat to the reliability of it. Inter-University Council consists of 14 public universities in Ohio, and that group frequently connects and supports each other. They have a Covid reopening committee, and I represent Miami. That group meets every week and we talk about policies that work well and don't work well. It's our way to make sure we're in line or further along than other universities.
- aa. Senator Gay: When you talked about the wastewater, I wanted to know if it's a study or precaution.
- bb. Dr. Large: Neither. It's more so just to give us an idea of what's happening on campus and to give us a sense of surveillance.
- cc. Alternate Marcum: Does Miami release waste water results to areas of campus to alert students to the possible presence of covid in their area?
- dd. Dr: Large. Recently we have not. Speaking for myself, my guess would be the idea that covid is everywhere on campus right now, and it's all about the risk threshold. I would say, Sydney, when we had some serious surges, we were informing people in those communities. If it became a safety

- issue and prevalence was high, we would let people know. Do you all remember remain in room? When there was high Covid rates students had to stay in their rooms and not leave their residence halls.
- ee. Secretary Waugh: How are things going over at Student Counseling Service? Still seeing long wait times? Is Campus Cares still running strong?
- ff. Dr. Large: SCS is very busy. What's happening nationally is happening here, which is the volume of students seeking care is higher and the complexity of their concerns are higher. At this very moment, SCS has capacity. As the semester progresses, this is where waitlists and waits will happen. A tip is if you're currently not well, go now. If you're curious about counseling, the time to schedule will be now. If the mental health fee goes through, we're hoping to hire more people. Campus Cares is alive and well. Campus Cares was developed pre-covid, in partnership with ASG and Ben, and it's an opportunity for students to have informal touch points with a faculty member from counseling. Intentionally it's not at SCS. The reason behind it is to try and eliminate barriers to counseling.
- gg. Senator Stack: The latest messages from the Covid responses say that we can take 2 at home tests, is that scheduled to continue throughout the entire semester?
- hh. Dr. Large: Our intention is to supply those so long as there's interest and a need. It is increasingly more difficult for us to find these, because our supply chain is not reliable. That's why we cap it at 2 and not 3. Originally, they came from the state for no cost, because they were free and we had a reliable supplier. Now, with Omicron, it's not regular at all. We received one shipment during J-term, with no promise of if they would come or when in the future. The university has tried to purchase more, and we do have an order placed and a tracking number, so hopefully we'll get these next week to supplement the tests from the state.

Organizations wanting funding for trips now must attend a separate funding. The trip must greatly aid professional/educational development of the group. We want to give orgs an opportunity to tell us why they are educationally or professionally developing.

- IX. New Business Item A: Approval of the Spring 2022 Cycle 1 Funding Allocations
 - a. Secretary Waugh: At the beginning of the year we received \$820,000. We carried over a surplus of \$957,125. Total, we had \$1,777,125. At the first opportunity in September we gave away \$117,000, and during the second we gave away \$103,000. Last night, we hit a two-year high with \$146,932. In the past, every funding hearing had requested over \$200k, so this is a very positive trend. 110 organizations submitted funding applications, and 96 of them were in a tier. 88 received some funding. We were able to provide percentages of funding received per organization.
 - b. Senator Chiapelli: Can you go over the appeal process?
 - c. Secretary Morris: Organizations can dispute it by emailing us, if we cannot immediately prove that it violates the standing rules we take it to the committee. The ASG bylaws supersede the F&A standing rules, and if you want to appeal it further the matter goes to the Judicial Council.
 - d. Senator Chiapelli: Could we change the bylaws?
 - e. Secretary Waugh: That would be the Administrative committee's job.
 - f. Senator Ogunnowo: Why is there an organization with only 3.5% received funding?
 - g. Secretary Waugh: Most of what they asked for was food, but they did have an advertising request.
 - h. Senator Davies: What is the issue with Racquetball Club?
 - i. Secretary Morris: There was confusion with what tier the org thought they were.
 - j. Senator Constandinidis: Can you explain the tiers?

- k. Secretary Waugh: There are four tiers, each with requirements to move up to the next tier.
- I. Senator Prebles: Do we not fund food products?
- m. Secretary Morris: We can fund sample-sized food dedicated to the purpose of the organization.
- n. Senator Davies: In a lot of the shabbat events, the food was sample-sized, why was the chicken soup approved?
- o. Secretary Waugh: The food was sample-sized and educational in nature.
- p. Senator McLaughlin: Can you explain debt-relief and penalties?
- q. Secretary Waugh: If it is less than \$150, it is forgiven. \$150-\$500, 25%. \$500-\$2500, 50%, >\$2500, no funding.
- r. Senator Ogunnowo: Can you explain more about how debt happens?
- s. Secretary Morris: You must apply for a sweep exemption and many forget that this is the case. There are also often mistakes with using the wrong account often.
- t. Secretary Waugh: A lot of orgs like to wait until the last minute to spend funds, let orgs know to spend their funds as early as I can.
- u. Senator Grabow: Out of the 0%, why did the MUCR's not get any of their \$5,000.
- v. Secretary Morris: We cannot fund anything political in nature. We were told by Student Activities to deny it, and they are allowed to appeal it.
- w. Senator Constandinidis: Do the funds get reset every semester?
- x. Secretary Waugh: Yes.
- y. Senator Davies: This is the most inquisitive Q&A I've experienced about the IOB. The secretaries provided a lot of insight and I am in favor of approval.
- z. Senator Constandinidis: I did not understand any of this until it was explained. They did a great job and I think it should pass.
- aa. Senator Sparks: We try to be as considerate as possible during the funding hearings, I am in full support.
- bb. Senator Kelley: I think it's great that we're getting allocations back up to pre-pandemic standards.
- cc. Secretary Waugh: Thanks to everyone that serves on the F&A committee, they were at Farmer all of last night.



II. Announcements from Chair

- A. Hi everyone and welcome back!! I hope week 1 of classes went well and you're taking time to adjust back to things. Here are some announcements and updates:
 - Personal update: I will be in senate every other week due to a class conflict. It will all of your responsibility to make sure on-campus updates are shared when they need to be! I know you all can do it though!!
 - 2. Committee Structure updates: this semester each week a committee member will be assigned to be in charge of the student concern tracker during senate as well as typing out committee meeting minutes. I will have a schedule typed out soon once we have the new senators join us after elections but for now we will do it week by week. I am very flexible with changing the schedule around as needed as long as you all give me warning! Not doing this on your assigned week (without giving me notice) can possibly result in an unexcused absence for the committee.



- a) This week: Grace Payne will be in charge of our concern tracker and Ryan Parker will be responsible for taking minutes next Sunday. If this does not work for either of you, just let me know!

- 4. Debra: Hi, I am Debra. Context: I was introduced to this term last semester. I thought it would be good to share with you today. So you know what you are consuming is inspiration porn. I do discuss ableism trigger warning. First coined by activist Stella Young in 2014. Objectives the person that has a disability while making people without disabilities feel good. This is not to say you feelings or emotions are invalid. Examples. A person in a wheelchair climbing a mountain. This is showing people with disabilities overcoming their disabilities. This is saying that people without disabilities have no excuse because if someone with disabilities can do it then so can you. People without disabilities are being praised as heroes because they are interacting with people with disabilities. Inspirational porn advocates for ableism. It upholds a false belief that people with disabilities are less than. Often hides evidence of underlying injustice and systemic failures. Before sharing or liking, reflect and ask yourself two questions: Why are you emotional? Who is the image for? Inspirational porn objectives people with disabilities. How do you stop this from happening? Educate yourself and others about this topic. In preparation for this presentation I watched different videos with people who are disable and speak about inspirational porn. Also you can do your own research.

Maysa: This hits close to home for me. I have three cousins with special needs. This is very important topic for me because they don't look at them as people.

Vada: Where do we draw the line between that person is encouraging because they did that in spite of everything and thinking a person is better than someone else?

Debra: When I watched a video. She talked about she is okay with being used as inspirational with her situation, but when it comes to her doing everyday tasks. People praising her for that. Some people with disabilities don't want to be seen as inspirations ever. The line is just with listening to people with disabilities is faint. You have to listen to them. Its important to listen there story.

Nikhil: A Lot of people who are motivational speakers are people with disabilities. You have to listen to their story and talk to them. You can talk about it, but you cant just seem someone on the street in a wheelchair and say you are an inspiration. I don't want to speak on there behalf, but maybe thats why they chose to be motivational speaker.

Debra: When I was doing my research it came back to consent. They didn't ask to be used as an inspirational picture. Like your saying kind of consent. If a person does put them as a motivational speaker than that is suppose to be an inspiration.

Victoria: Deaf community. They see it as a gain. People see it as they lost something, but they actually gain something. It brings out peoples personality. Thank you for this topic. It made me reflect.

Debra: I was watching a video. Where two deaf parents had a baby and the doctor told them the baby was deaf and they cheered because they saw it as a gain. Doctor did not.
